FEBRUARY 9, 1964 – THE YOUTH REVOLUTION TAKES OVER.




JULY 20, 1969 – THE TECHNOLOGY AGE TAKES SHAPE -THE MOON LANDING.



- 1960's A Decade of Polar Opposites First Half vs Second Half (Was it a decay or revolution of social norms?)
- The youth lead the social revolt against the conservative norms (status quo) of the establishment leading to new social norms for clothing, music, drugs, sexuality, formalities and schooling.

WHAT WAS HAPPENING IN THE 1960'S – THE WORLD
The 60's were a transition to the desire for Freedom of the Individual - expressed in long hair, casual dress and loud rock and roll music, as opposed to rigid conservative solid norms. The youth involved in the movement become known as 'Hippies'.





WHAT WAS HAPPENING IN THE 1960'S – THE WORLD A relaxation of social taboos relating to racism and sexism. The leading nations turn to the political left, as civil rights, healthcare for the elderly, more freedom for women, the liberalism of the press become priorities. Martin Luther King becomes a major voice in the civil rights movement against racial discrimination, although civil resistance campaigns produce major conflict between government authorities and activists.


Music & movies lead the social movement to break social taboos.



• The confrontation between the US and Soviet Union dominates geopolitics. World War 3 almost breaks out through the Cuban Missile crisis. US and Soviet Union battle over control of the Third World. The Vietnam War leads to the anti war movement.



- The space race dominates science, leading to the 1969 Apollo 11 landing on the moon.
- Drug use becomes socially accepted for the first time.
- Prosperity leads to a major expansion of the middle class.



- Domestic technology becomes main stream (Clothes Dryer, BBQ, Air Conditioner, Food Preparation).
- Decolonization and Independence becomes a movement in Africa, as 32 countries gain independence.
- Crime rates rise, especially in urban centers.



- Technology takes shape— Touch tone telephones, computer video games (Spacewar!, the first), the hatchback, the 8-Track Tape, computer mouse all introduced in the 1960's.
- Fashion trends Mop-top haircut, the beehive hairdo, the 'bikini', bell bottom jeans, tie-dye prints, mini skirt.
- Pop culture is defined by people like Martin Luther King, The Beatles, Muhammad Ali, Bob Dylan, Jimi Hendrix, John Wayne,



WHAT WAS HAPPENING IN THE 1960'S – CANADA


- New Canadian Flag is approved (1965).
- Decade of Social Change with the Canadian Bill of Rights being approved (1960), Social Insurance cars being issued (1964), Canada Pension Plan is established (1965), Socialized medicine is introduced in Saskatchewan (1962), Women's Rights is highlighted in reformed divorce laws, abortion
- People of First Nations given the right to vote (1960).
- The New Democratic Party is formed (1961)



WHAT WAS HAPPENING IN THE 1960'S – CANADA

- Trans Canada Highway is opened (1962).
- The Royal Commission on Bilingualism and Biculturalism leads to a bilingual civil service (1963).
- CBC introduces color broadcasting (1966).
- Expo 67 in Montreal becomes center of the world attention during Canada's Centennial celebrations (1967).
- Trudeaumania hits Canada in 1968 during the Federal Election.





WHAT WAS HAPPENING IN THE 1960'S – NOVA SCOTIA Nova Scotia was governed by a Conservative government

- during the 1960's.
- Robert L. Stanfield served as premier during 1956–67, while
 G. I. Smith served from 1967-70. Under the Stanfield
 government new hospitals were built and programs were
 put in place to help citizens overcome poverty, ill-health, and
 discrimination, although taxes were raised to pay for such

services.





WHAT WAS HAPPENING IN THE 1960'S - NOVA SCOTIA

- The 1960's are defined by 'Urban Renewal' in Halifax. Projects such as Scotia Square, Mulgrave Park and Uniacke Square Public Housing, Cogswell Street interchange and Historical Properties get built replacing old sections of the city.
- The most controversial project under the name of 'Urban Renewal' was the elimination of Africville. In October 1962, the City decided to eliminate Africville and relocate its residents elsewhere in Halifax. The process of relocating Africville residents began in 1964; the demolition of the community was largely completed by the end of 1967.



WHAT WAS HAPPENING IN THE 1960'S - NOVA SCOTIA


- Offshore drilling for oil and natural gas begins in the late 1960s.
- Traditional resource industries continue the post WW2 decline. Most notable were many fish plants, along with the Sydney Steel Mill (closing in 1967).
- Halifax hosts the first Canada Summer Games in 1969.






Hammonds Plains at the turn of the 1960's was still a small community centered along the Hammonds Plains Road, which had recently been upgraded and paved.

THE BIG EVENTS IN HAMMONDS PLAINS DURING THE 1960'S

- **1. The Consolidation of our Schools**
- 2. The End of the Forestor's Community Hall
- **3. Fire Departments emerge**
- 4. Subdvisions bring new neighbours
- 5. The Pin Hi Golf Course opens
- 6. The last days of the Hammonds Plains Mills



During the early 1960's, The Department of Education were making moves to improving the quality of education in N. S.

The Civil Rights Movement in the U.S. contributed to the DOE moving to inclusive schools as part of this improvement.



In Hammonds Plains, there were 2 schools that were beyond capacity and for the most part were segregated. In 1963, the decision was made to consolidate the 2 schools in Hammonds Plains into one.





A transition plan was put in place to handle the consolidation, until the new building could be built. The new school, located next to the Irving Station, finally started construction in 1966.



A major part of the transition plan was to mix students from both schools, starting in the 1966/67 school year.



Therefore, each building hosted specific grades for both schools until the new school was built.



The new Consolidated School opened in January 1968, with 12 classrooms, a library, a gym and music room and an office.

Official Opening was on June 5, 1968

Uplands Park Named Village By Dulcie Conrad

Come January I, Halifax County will have a brand new village — Uplands Park. Its three-man commission will have all the powers to build sidewalks, nequire land, collect garbage, purchase dumps, install sewer and water systems and provide police and fire protection. They can even build a village jail and appoint local building inspectors.

None of this can be done, however, unless its residents have said so by resolution passed at a meeting.

The three men appointed by the government to hold office until February 4 are Richard Windsor, Bruno Dombrowski and Gerald Verge. A soon as they are sworn in, one will be selected as chairman. Then, they plan to find some office space, hire a clerk-treasurer, and open up for business.

At the meeting in February, it will be up to the ratepayers to appoint their own village commissioners.

Property taxes will still be collected by the Municipality for the County of Halifax but the funds needed to provide the village with services will be turned over to the commission to carry out the operation.

Under the Village Service Act, the commission will even be able to levy a \$10 poil tax. All its books, records and accounts, shall also be open, without fee, to the inspection of any elector.

An interesting section in this same Act, under which the village must operate, is one dealing with planning legislation now in effect in Nova Scotia.

II, in the opinion of the Minister of Municipal Affairs, Halifax County council and its planning board have provided and are enforcing adequate zoning, subdivision control and services under the Town Planning Act, then he shall not approve any planning by-laws passed by the village.

And, again, if the council has prepared an official master plan of development and such is in effect in the new village, then the commissioners shall not have the power to prepare an official plan or to pass any zoning by-laws.

The boundaries of the new village are: on the north by the new Hammonds Plains or Yankeetown Road; on



INTERESTING ASPECTS OF 1960'S LIFE IN HAMMONDS PLAINS

- Hammonds Plains considered a conservative, rural community through the 60's.
- Book Mobile visits community.
- Traffic increases significantly on Hammonds Plains Road.

- Community Suppers still a trademark of community.
- Major snowstorms of early 60's make winters memorable.





INTERESTING ASPECTS OF 1960'S LIFE IN HAMMONDS PLAINS

- Fire Department becomes the leading organization in community, replacing IODE.
- Kings Clothing Truck makes regular visits, along with peddlers.
- Students are presented with wider educational experiences.
- Save Easy and Green Gables Convenience Store leads the new style stores. Groceries supplied by Save-Easy, including home deliveries.
- Hammonds Plains has a Hockey Team in western Halifax County Hockey League.
- Hay is still made with horse drawn cutters and rakers.
- Community has air raid siren. Students conduct drills in school.
