#### **Our Past – Yankeetown United Baptist Church**



The Yankeetown United Baptist Church - 1960's

One of the more distinctive buildings located in the Hammonds Plains area during the 20<sup>th</sup> century was the Yankeetown Baptist Church. It is was known because of its size ... as it was one of the tiniest churches in Canada.

The Yankeetown Church was built in 1896-97. The original purpose of building the church was to give the young children of the Yankeetown area a place to attend Sunday School, without having to walk to the First Baptist Church, located about 5 Kilometers away. The church was dedicated in July of 1897. Two members of the community who were instrumental in seeing the church get built were James Smith and Mrs. Tremaine Thompson.

The Church measured only 12 by 15 feet, with a capacity for seating about 12-15 folks. The first Sunday School session was held only two days after its dedication on July 11, 1897.

Throughout the first part of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, the church was used for both church services and Sunday school. Typically services were held twice monthly, with attendance from 3-12 individuals. On the inside the church had a few benches for worshipers, a tiny organ, a heater stove and a table that was used as the pulpit by the minister.

For most of its life, the church was associated with the Hammonds Plains First Baptist Church, with the minister from that church conducting the services at the Yankeetown Church. The church was moved at least twice within the Yankeetown area, during its existence.

For many years, church had an active sewing circle group which provided fund raising support. With improved transportation methods during the second half of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, the small church felt the pressures of a more mobile community and consequently started losing families until by 1980, only a few regular church goers were left. Finally during the 1980's, the church was retired, sold off to a charitable group, and soon after dismantled.

The original hall was built by the local chapter of the Foresters in 1912 on the piece of land where the Fire Station is now.

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
