

This is very rare photo taken in Kemptown between 1910 and 1920. It is believed to show members of the Little and Green families, who lived in Kemptown, at the time. The family members are standing in front of what is thought to be a lumber camp located in Kemptown. The barrels shown in the photo can be assumed were made in Kemptown.

## A Hammonds Plains Heritage Flash



Hammonds Plains is named after British Naval Officer and Colonial Administrator, **Sir Andrew Snape Hamond**.

From 1780 until 1784, Hamond was the Resident Commissioner of the Royal Navy for Nova Scotia, having been appointed by the King of England. He was additionally appointed Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia in 1781.

In his role of Commissioner of the Navy, he oversaw the Ship Yards in Halifax. When the original Hammonds Plains land grants were issued in 1786, to 46 business folks from Halifax, they named the grants after Hamond. Most of the original grantees had connections with the Ship Yards, so when it was time to give the new land grants a name, they were given permission to name it after the respected previous Commissioner of the Ship Yards.

Interesting to note, that at the time of the naming of the grants, Hamond had moved on, and was back in England. It is believed that Hamond never returned to Nova Scotia, after he left in 1784.






# A Hammonds Plains Murder Trial – 1930's Style

On November 29<sup>th</sup>, 1931, Hammonds Plains resident Harrison Eisenhauer was critically injured after being attacked by deer poachers, while investigating a complaint in his role as a Halifax County Forest Ranger. Eisenhauer was hit with a rifle butt end in the facial area, when he and a colleague came upon four individuals who had firearms in their possession. He would remain in hospital after the attack for two weeks, and sadly died there on December 12<sup>th</sup> from septic poisoning, related to his injuries. The incident made headline news in the Halifax area. For example, the following is the front page of the Halifax Chronicle dated December 14<sup>th</sup>, 1931, which shows the interest in the case.



Upon his death, three individuals were arraigned in court and charged with murder, as the result of the incident. After the preliminary court hearing in December 1931, the Crown Prosecutor decided to downgrade the charges to manslaughter, based on the evidence of the case. At the court case in 1932, the charged individuals were found not guilty, as the court ruled that the death was the result of infection, as opposed to the initial injury.



Harrison Eisenhauer's death has been honored with his name appearing on several Peace Officer Monuments, including the National Peace Officers Memorial on Parliament Hill in Ottawa. The photo on the left is of the plaque that appears at Shubenacadie Wildlife Park in Eisenhauer's memory.
